Anticipation Guides (Herber, 1978) are typically a list of statements related to a topic that act as scaffolding for student understanding of the text. Students indicate if they agree or disagree with each of the statements.

If the anticipation guide includes, as our example does, statements that are sometimes true and sometimes false, emphasize that students are to describe the conditions under which state- ments are true or false.
